Continuing to Serve . . . and Growing...

In 2014-15, the Partnership for Children of Wayne County continued its tradition of providing high-quality services to the youngest citizens of Wayne County by working with their parents and care providers. Services have remained steady in spite of increased costs, level funding, and more mandates from state government. Working with our community partners, we were able to maintain quality and quantity as we continue to fulfill our mission of providing early care and education, health and family support services to young children and their families.

Our annual events such as the Teddy Bear Picnic, Child Care Conference and Born Learning Festival continued to highlight our work, while our day-to-day services such as parent trainings and technical assistance to child care facilities provided ongoing support for parents and child care providers. Our staff has grown as we brought the *Parents as Teachers* program in-house, which provides ongoing home visitation and instruction to parents.

In addition, our continued involvement with the early childhood literacy coalition in Wayne County led us to work with Wayne County Public Library to develop a new program, *Students on Adventures in Reading (SOAR)*, which incorporates the Every Child Ready to Read curriculum into a coordination of literacy efforts with our community partners. The Partnership hopes to launch the program early next year.

As we move through these leaner financial times, the Partnership is continually looking for new sources of funding for our programs and adapting what we do to the current needs of the county's youngest children. Current state requirements to increase our local funding has led us to kick off our first "Big Ask" campaign— asking local businesses and individuals to invest in our children by making financial contributions to the Partnership. Our annual meeting will provide the kick-off for this effort to not only raise awareness of our services, but also help support our programs financially.

For fifteen years, we have worked to ensure that our children receive everything they need to become successful. We pride ourselves on being Wayne County's leading champions for parents and others who work with our greatest resource – our youngest children – every day.





IMPACT ON THE COMMUNITY

- CCR&R staff conducted 78 professional development trainings for early childhood professionals.
- 374 instances of on-site technical assistance were provided in 67 facilities to increase child care quality.
- 793 children registering for kindergarten received a book bag, parent transition guide and school supplies through our Kindergarten Book Bag Project.
- 63% of children in regulated child care in Wayne County were enrolled in centers with at least 5 Lead Teacher Education points.
- 97 child care providers from 36 facilities received WAGE\$ salary supplements.
- 100% of Wayne County participants indicated that WAGE\$ encouraged them to pursue further education. 96% were encouraged to stay in their current job.
- Approximately 1,737 children were impacted by the WAGE\$ project.
- The Partnership allocated 40.5% of its Smart Start service dollars for subsidy to support working families.
- Smart Start funding provided subsidized child care to 141 Wayne County children.
- 28 NC Pre-K classrooms were housed in 18 facilities including public schools, Head Start and private child care facilities located throughout the county.
- 600 children were served in high-quality NC Pre-K classrooms.

IMPACT ON THE COMMUNITY

- 20 trainings were conducted on health and safety issues for 288 child care providers from 58 child care facilities.
- Six facilities received *Be Active Kids* trainings, impacting 280 children and 25 child care providers.
- 76 facilities received child care health consultation services.
- 349 vision, hearing and developmental screenings were conducted.
- 91% of child care providers stated that the services provided by the Child Care Health Consultant improved the health and safety environment of their child care facilities.
- 14 Safe Kids events were held.
- 205 car seats were checked for proper usage and installation. This includes appropriate usage of seatbelt systems.
- Six child seat violation citation diversion classes were held in conjunction with the Wayne County District Attorney's office.
- Five early childhood centers implemented Shape NC best practices to promote healthy eating and active play.
- Shape NC met best practices at the Model Early Learning Center (MELC) at Wayne Community College Child Care. Wayne Community College has received Notice of Achievement on becoming one of the state's demonstration sites.

IMPACT ON THE COMMUNITY

- The Partnership participated in 40 community events.
- Proceeds from the Lobster & Shrimp Fest fundraiser provided over \$9,800 to support Partnership for Children activities.
- 301 parents participated in comprehensive prenatal education classes. 84 of the 301 participants were young moms.
- 100% of the prenatal education participants reported during follow-up that they had more prenatal care knowledge and that the instruction they received helped prepare them for labor and delivery.
- 891 home visits were conducted with 54 families impacting 76 children with parent education.
- 33 parents participated in at least one group meeting or playgroup.
- 62 children received developmental screenings through Parents As Teachers.
- Four Incredible Years series were conducted for parents of children ages three to five.
- 100% of parents that attended at least 12 of 15 Incredible Years sessions reported that they used effective limit setting using nonviolent discipline.
- Over 1,900 people participated in the Born Learning Festival.
- 203 volunteers contributed approximately 600 hours at the Born Learning Festival.
- 84% of Born Learning and kindergarten registration survey respondents strongly agreed with the concept that children begin learning at birth and that parents can help their children learn in everyday moments.
